### **Gabrielle Kibble AO, Chair**

Gabrielle Kibble is the Administrator of Liverpool Council; Director of Sydney Olympic Park Authority; and Trustee and Deputy Chancellor of the University of Western Sydney. Gabrielle Kibble was Chairman Sydney Water from August 1998 to May 2007 and a Non-Executive Director of Sydney Water Corporation.



Gabrielle Kibble has extensive experience in the public sector, particularly in urban planning and infrastructure development. From December 1987 until November 1997 she was the chief executive officer of the Department of Urban Affairs and Planning. From July 1992 until April 1994. Gabrielle was also Director General of the NSW Department of Housing.

Gabrielle Kibble has a Bachelor of Arts and also a Diploma of Town and Country Planning from the University of Sydney. She is a Fellow of the Royal Australian Planning Institute. In 1997 she received the Sidney Luker Memorial medal of the Royal Australian Planning Institute for an outstanding contribution to urban planning in NSW.

On Australia Day in 1994 Gabrielle Kibble became an Officer of the Order of Australia.

In June 1999 the University of NSW conferred on her the degree of Doctor of Science, *honoris causa*.

### **Sharon Sullivan AO, Deputy Chair**

Sharon Sullivan is Deputy Chair of the Heritage Council. She is also Chair of the Heritage Council State Heritage Register Committee. Sharon has a BA (Hons) and an MA (Hons) in History. She has worked in heritage place management and land management generally for thirty years, and has been involved in the development of cultural heritage management systems in Australia. She has been Cultural Heritage Manager, then Regional Manager and Deputy Executive Director of the NSW National Parks & Wildlife Service. She has also had the roles of Executive Director of the Australian Heritage Commission and First Assistant Secretary, Australian & World Heritage Group for the Department of Environment and Heritage and Australian Government Leader of Delegation, World Heritage Committee. She is a fellow of the Australian Academy of the Humanities, a member of the Australian Institute of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies, and a member of the National Executive Committee of Australia ICOMOS.

She is an adjunct professor at both the School of Anthropology, Archaeology and Sociology, James Cook University of North Queensland, and School of Natural and Rural

Systems Management, University of Queensland. She is a consultant to the Australian Government, the Getty Conservation Institute, World Monument Fund, World Bank, and World Heritage Committee on various aspects of cultural heritage management.

In addition, she is the author of a range of publications including, jointly with Michael Pearson, *Looking after Heritage Places*, 2<sup>nd</sup> ed, Melbourne University Press, 1998, which is a university textbook on heritage place conservation and management. She has done planning and teaching work with heritage site managers in Australia, USA, Cambodia, Africa and China on cultural heritage assessment management issues. Sharon and her partner Malin run a cattle farm on the Nymboida River in northern NSW.

Rosemary Annable is a consultant historian and archaeologist and has been working in the field of heritage conservation for eighteen years. She has undertaken a wide variety of historical and archaeological commissions for government departments (Commonwealth, State and Local), architectural and planning firms and private clients.

### **Julie Bindon, council member**

Julie is the founding Director and currently the CEO of JBA Urban Planning Consultants based in North Sydney. A graduate in town planning from the University of Auckland, with post graduate qualifications in land economy from Sydney University, Julie is also a member of the Planning Institute of Australia, an honorary fellow of the Australian Property Institute and member of the Australian Institute of Company Directors. In 2003 Julie won the National Association of Women in Construction (NAWIC) award for Achievement as a Business Woman.

Prior to establishing JBA, Julie was a Director of Scott Carver (Architects, Urban Planners & Interior Designers) for five years, and prior to that the Principal Planner for the Rice Daubney Group (Architects). Julie is a past Chair of the Planning Committee of the NSW Division of the Property Council of Australia (PCA), and a past member of the PCA's NSW Executive. She is an occasional lecturer at the University of Sydney and UTS Sydney and a member of the Premier's Urban Design Advisory Committee. She was formerly a member of the Lord Mayor of Sydney's Development Advisory Committee, the Sydney University Planning Research Centre Council and a member of the judging panel of the Royal Australian Planning Institute's Awards of Excellence.

Working for over 25 years as a private consultant in New South Wales, Julie has a considerable range and depth of experience in most urban planning matters, particularly in advising on the planning constraints to development and in the preparation of development and rezoning applications. Julie has appeared on many occasions as an expert witness in the Land and Environment Court, and before planning Commissions of Inquiry.

Some of the projects for which Julie played a major role include a masterplan for a new city of approximately 100,000 people north of Hanoi, Vietnam; rezoning of the 51 hectare AGL site at Mortlake; the World Square mixed use development; the office and heritage project at 363 George Street Sydney; 126 Philip Street Sydney and the KENS site office project; several high rise residential towers in the Sydney CBD and at Chatswood, "Moore Park Gardens" 600 unit residential estate at Moore Park; the Chatswood Chase

Shopping Centre; various projects in the City West redevelopment area; the James Milson retirement village expansion in North Sydney; Review of Part 3 of the EP& A Act (the plan making part of the Act) for the PCA, and the Macquarie Shopping Centre masterplan and integration with proposed new rail station for AMP.

**Ross Fitzgerald, council member**

Professor Ross Fitzgerald is a member of the New South Wales Parole Board, the Administrative Decisions Tribunal, the NSW Government Expert Advisory Committee on Alcohol and Other Drugs and was appointed as a member of the Heritage Council of NSW in 1994. He is also a member of the Values Education Advisory Committee established by the federal Minister for Education, Dr Brendan Nelson.

Ms Lisa Corbyn is the Director General of the Department of Environment and Conservation, which brought together the National Parks and Wildlife Service, Environment Protection Authority, Resource NSW and the Botanic Gardens. She previously held the position of the Director General of the NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA), from November 2000 to September 2003, helping to set up that Authority in the early 1990's in her role as Deputy Director of the Ministry for the Environment.
