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**Meeting with Community Representatives.**

Before the formal commencement of the meeting members of the Heritage Council met with various community representatives of the Bathurst.

The Chair introduced the following community representatives to members and outlined the purpose of regional visits of the Heritage Council.

Issues discussed included:

- the long term aim of a regional museum in Bathurst and the successful relocation of the Sommerville Collection in the former TAFE buildings which could be eventually located in such a museum;
- the conflict between motor racing and heritage as a focus for tourism in Bathurst;
- marketing of the three main house museums being the former Government House, Ms Trails House and the Chifley House;
- the recognition of the significance of Aboriginal Heritage in the Bathurst region;
- Bathurst Centenary of Federation Celebrations;
- the building of a Carillon to house a peal of six bells from the former Cathedral built in 1885, a nomination for inclusion on the SHR was suggested;
- the incomplete War Memorial Carillion;
- pressures of dual occupancy on conservation areas. and
- After further discussion representatives thanked members of the Heritage Office for the opportunity to meet.

**Meeting with Representatives of the Aboriginal Community**

The Chair introduced Warwick Peckham and Shirley Scott representing the Bathurst Aboriginal Land Council.

Issues discussed included:

- the achievements of the Land Council including the establishment of their own premises and the recent funding to prepare a three year business plan;
- the work with the National Parks and Wildlife Service in relation to sacred sites ensuring that these sites of Aboriginal significance are secure and maintained; and
- the Aboriginal significance of Mt Panorama in relation to the Wiradjuri people;

After further discussion representatives thanked members of the Heritage Office for the opportunity to meet.

### **3.0 Reports**

#### **3.2.1 Chairs Report**

In the absence of the Chair for this part of the meeting the Acting Chair read the following report.

“My activities in the past two months have been diverse.

I was pleased to attend the first meeting of the Heritage Council’s Strategy Committee since the release of our strategic plan in August 1999. This was an opportunity to review progress and adjust timeframes for some of the performance indicators. While the limited resources of the Heritage Office are an impediment to the realisation of our strategic goals, there has nevertheless been quite remarkable progress on a number of fronts. I congratulate everyone who has had a hand in these achievements.

The second of our Heritage Council luncheons at the University of Sydney Women’s College was another opportunity to meet influential people in an informal setting. These included:

- the Lord Mayor of Parramatta, Councillor Lorraine Wearne;
- Westpac’s Head of Community Involvement, Gina Anderson;
- Penelope Seidler; and
- Graham Jahn, NSW President, RAIA

Finally, I was very pleased to attend the International Women’s Day celebration at the Heritage Office. Three of my female colleagues in the Heritage Council gave an impressive account of their personal and professional lives. While representing a diversity of experiences and achievements all were driven by a common commitment to that elusive but essential concept – the public good.

Having launched the Federation Towns Program in Tenterfield last year I am pleased that we are meeting today in Bathurst, which had such a significant part to play in the march towards nationhood. I visited the city for the National Trust Heritage Awards three years ago and look forward to seeing more of this historic place.”

#### **3.2.2 Director’s Report**

The Director spoke to her report highlighting the progress towards the Heritage Act amendments and the recent National Heritage Council Chairs and Officials meeting which provided an opportunity to showcase a number of NSW heritage achievements particularly in relation to government owned heritage assets.

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### **3.3 Members Reports**

Richard Mackay spoke to members in relation to the work of the State Heritage Register Committee. He pointed out that the 1996 State Heritage Policy, contains a key platform which is the compilation of the State Heritage Register.

Members noted that the Committee will continue to have a reactive rather than a proactive role until the Register is reasonably comprehensive. It was pointed out that while the Committee has added several hundred items, most of which are in State ownership, there may be some thousands of items not yet listed that would be of State significance. It was advised further that the Committee is not resourced to complete SHR listings at a level of thoroughness that is desired.

Members were advised that there is a potential for future problems for the Heritage Council in relation to the comprehensiveness of the Register.

Members were also advised that the Committee sees a range of possibilities between two extreme options: that the Heritage Council advise the Government that it does not have the resources to implement the policy, or at the other extreme, that the Heritage Council advise the Government to follow the Tasmanian model and take all listings on non statutory registers, advertise them all and list all those that are not objected to. There are clearly potential problems with either option.

After further discussion it was

***that the Heritage Council notes that there are major resourcing issues associated with the completion of the SHR and that a further report will be provided by the SHR Committee.***

### **4.0 Matters for Consideration and Decision**

#### **4.1 Heritage Council Advisory Panels**

##### **4.1.1 Membership of TAG Committee**

Members considered a report which proposed changes in the membership of the Technical Advisory Group and associated Reference Group.

It was noted that the tenure of the current membership of the Panel came to an end in December 2000 and that Alan Croker has become the new Chair of TAG following Don Godden's retirement.

**4.1.2 Chairmanship of Fire, Access and Services Advisory Panel (FASAP)**

Members were advised that Louise Cox, Chair of FASAP, has resigned from the position as of February 2001 although she will remain a member of the Panel.

It was noted that it is usual practice for the Chair of Heritage Council Panels or Standing Committees, to be a member or alternate member of the Heritage Council. Members were advised that it is proposed that Bruce Pettman, Principal Architect, Heritage Building Design Services, Department of Public Works and Services, and alternate member of the Heritage Council for Chris Johnson, the Government Architect become the new Chair of FASAP.

***Resolved***

***that the Heritage Council:***

- 1. endorse the appointment of Mr Bruce Pettman as the new Chair of the Heritage Council Fire Access and Services Advisory Panel.***
- 2. thank Ms Louise Cox for her efforts and dedication as Chair of the Heritage Council Fire Access and Services Advisory Panel.***

**4.2 Parramatta REP – Harris Park Controls, Camellia/Rydalmere**

Terry Barnes and Richard Mackay left the meeting for discussion of this item.

Members considered a report which sought the Heritage Council's endorsement of the final draft planning controls for Harris Park precinct, to go to DUAP and the Minister for gazettal into law.

Members attention was drawn to the maps provided.

It was noted that the Heritage Office has worked with DUAP and Parramatta City Council since

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public exhibition of the controls in November 2000 to respond to issues raised in public submissions.

It was also noted that as a result final planning responses have now been formulated in the amended controls and as a result a number of changes are recommended to the draft maps and written instrument prior to gazettal.

Members were informed of the amendments which required further clarification in relation to the FSR in respect of the Arthur Street Village area.

***Resolved:***

***That the Heritage Council endorse the final draft REP Amendment 2 (Harris Park) controls to go to DUAP & the Minister for gazettal subject to an amendment in respect the FSR for the Arthur Street, Village area and delegates to the Director of the HO authority to determine this matter on behalf of the Heritage Council.***

#### **4.3 Sustainability and Heritage Draft Policy**

Members considered a report on a draft Heritage Council policy and action plan on sustainability and heritage and were provided with a draft policy for consideration.

Members were advised that Heritage has played only a minor role in discussions in Australia so far on sustainability and sustainable development, and heritage management has not been largely integrated into the wider concept of sustainable development.

Members were also advised that the link between heritage conservation and sustainable development can be made explicit and it is entirely appropriate that the Heritage Council have its own policy on sustainable development and promote its role in achieving sustainability and sustainable development targets. Cultural and natural heritage is included in the National State of the Environment Report for Sustainability.

***Resolved:***

***that the Heritage Council:***

- 1. agree that the discussion paper and amended draft Heritage Council policy on Sustainability and Heritage is circulated for wider comment;***
- 2. consider the policy further at the June 2001 meeting;***
- 3. that the report to the Policy should describe the place of sustainability and heritage within the Heritage Councils Strategic Plan; and***
- 4. nominate Susan Macdonald of the Heritage Office and a Heritage Council member to be considered for membership of the Sustainability Advisory Council.***

#### **4.4 Heritage Council Meeting Code and Procedures**

Members considered a report on the possible review of the Heritage Council Code of Conduct and Code of Meeting Practice.

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Members noted that the current Heritage Council Code of Meeting Practice and Code of Conduct were developed in 1998/99 to assist the Heritage Council to make good decisions and to follow consistent and transparent processes in its deliberations.

It was further noted that a number of complex cases before the Council have led to some discussion among Heritage Council members as to whether processes could be further improved to achieve better outcomes in terms of the Council's responsibilities under the Act.

Members were advised that factors impacting on current processes for decision making included high community expectations in relation to heritage, impact of amendments to the Heritage Act in 1999, impact of Integrated Development Approvals. The Council has taken a number of initiatives including the opening of Council meetings for input and presentations from proponents and the making of meeting agendas publicly available and the information series "Introducing the Heritage Council" which has made the processes of the Heritage Council more widely known.

Members further discussed the report and

***Resolved:***

***that the Heritage Council establish a subcommittee with a membership of Michael Collins, Mary-Lyn Taylor, Terry Barnes, Elsa Atkin and Rosalind Strong to review the Code of Conduct and Code of Meeting Practice in the light of today's discussion and to make recommendations to the June 2001 meeting of the Council.***

#### **4.5 Heritage Council Strategic Plan**

Members considered a report on a review of the Heritage Council and Heritage Office Strategic Plan undertaken by the Heritage Council's Strategy Committee and noted that more realistic timelines have been given to some of the plan's key performance indicators.

It was noted that the review recommended that the compilation of the State Heritage Register and implementation of delegations to local government need to be a priority and that there needs to be closer monitoring and publicising of the Teaching Heritage website leading to greater community use of this resource.

Members were also advised that the Strategy Committee considered it inappropriate for the Heritage Council itself to coordinate an accreditation process for heritage consultants, the recently completed economic effects study needs to be well publicised and the Heritage Council's previously approved media strategy needs to be revived in consultation with the Minister's office.

***Resolved:***

***that the Heritage Council endorses the Committee's amendments to the plan.***

#### **4.6 Section 60 application – Grand Drive, Moore Park**

Members considered a report on a proposal to create a new ceremonial entrance to Centennial & Moore Parks on Anzac Parade (based on historic intentions never fully realised), and works to

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enhance the ceremonial drive between Anzac Parade and Robertson Road for users.

Members were advised that the work included construction of a new paved forecourt with flagpole, perimeter seating and park entry structure; rationalising access and parking arrangements for the tennis courts on Anzac Parade; relocating 7 existing trees, removing 1 tree, planting new trees around the new forecourt; narrowing the existing ceremonial (Old Grand) drive and resurfacing of it, installing irrigation and grass swales to narrow the drive's width and increase absorption, removal of timber fencing on southern edge of Lang Road, construction of stone fence piers on southern palisade fence along Old Grand Drive; and closure of Robertson Road to through traffic, reconfiguring road arrangements at that entry to Centennial Park, creating a shared traffic zone for people, horses and cars, changing the road surface treatments and minor kerb alignments to improve the safety of users.

Members discussed the proposal and generally expressed some concerns in relation to some aspects. After further discussion it was

***Resolved:***

***that the Heritage Council***

- 1. notes the closing date for submissions is 14<sup>th</sup> April 2001***
- 2. resolves that the Heritage Council forms a subcommittee to consider the application and to advise the Director of the Heritage Office whether approval to the application should be given and if so to delegate to the Director the approval of this application.***
- 3. nominate Philip Thalys, Garry Fielding and Rosemary Annable to comprise the subcommittee.***

## **5.0 Presentations**

### **5.1 Strategic Development Project**

Mary Parry presented an interim report to members on the progress of the Strategic Development Project.

It was noted that there was a very good response for the request for interviews and that the project was positively received.

Members noted a summary of comments which have been received from HC members and a range of CEOs in the public sector who have been interviewed about their view of the role and functioning of the Heritage Council and the Heritage Office. It was also noted that these comments will be included in a formal report which will be shortly presented to the Director of the Heritage Office. The next stage of the project will involve interviews with CEOs in the private sector and local government.

***Resolved:***

***that the Heritage Council note the presentation.***

### **5.2 Economics of Heritage Listing**

The Deputy Chair presented a report on the findings and determination of further actions in

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relation to the Economics of Heritage Listing Study which was commissioned by the National Heritage Council Chairs and Officials in 1998.

Members were advised that the project was overseen by a steering committee of NSW Heritage Council, the Heritage Council of WA and the Australian Heritage Commission and managed by the NSW Heritage Office and that the Steering Committee divided the project into two sections which were the analysis of the social/economic cost/benefit for the local community, and cost/benefit analysis of heritage requirements for the owner.

To maintain a manageable scope of work, the study focussed on commercial (non-residential) properties in the urban environment.

Members noted that the chief objectives of the research project were linked to the development economics of heritage listed commercial property assets.

It was also noted that the study was initially to have a much wider brief. However, the objective was refined to be the production of guidelines, which would enable the preparation and assessment of economic and financial information, submitted as part of development applications involving heritage items and heritage conservation areas, in a standardised, comparable and easily understandable manner.

Members further noted that the report provided a substantial body of analysis which provides direction for further work which will need considerably greater resources for further research.

***Resolved:***

***that the Heritage Council:***

- 1. discuss the outcomes of the study with key stakeholders in NSW;***
- 2. seek the engagement of bodies representing the property industry in developing further some of the suggested research directions; and***
- 3. explores further avenues for continuing the research into the economics of heritage (with other organisations such as the Getty Conservation Institute and Macquarie University).***

## **6.0 Matters for Discussion and Noting**

### **6.1 Heritage Council Chairs and Officials Meeting – Benchmarking Study**

Members considered a report on the Heritage Council Chairs and Officials Meeting – Benchmarking Study and noted that the issue of resources available for heritage management has been a major topic at meetings of Heritage Council Chairs and Officials over the past several years.

Members were advised that a paper was prepared for the March 2001 Sydney meeting which compared resources and costs for similar processes in all states.

It was noted that the analysis, while still preliminary, provides considerable information about overall resources for heritage management on a state by state and per capita basis. It also provides information about relative resources attributed to different processes in each state.

It was further noted that the benchmarking study, which will now be conducted annually in

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October or November, will form the basis of further strategic discussion within the NSW Heritage Office about efficiencies and effectiveness in current heritage management processes, as well as discussion within government about overall resourcing of the functions of the Office.

***Resolved:***

***that the Heritage Council***

- 1. note and provide advice and comment to the Director on the information contained in the report.***
- 2. thank the Staff of the HO and HCWA for their respective involvement and inputs.***

**6.2 Great Northern Hotel Prosecution**

Members received a report on the outcome of the prosecution under the Heritage Act against Mrs Donna Preston and Hazaran Pty Ltd for unauthorised works at the Great Northern Hotel, Newcastle and noted that this is the first prosecution under the amended Heritage Act.

Members were advised that Mrs Preston and Hazaran Pty Ltd pleaded guilty to carrying out unauthorised works between September 1999 and March 2000 to the Ground Floor of the Great Northern Hotel. Members were also advised that the Court convicted both defendants and each incurred a \$5,500 fine and \$6,500 prosecution costs.

Mrs Preston has indicated that she will appeal the severity of the penalty.

***Resolved:***

***that the Heritage Council:***

- 1. note the report; and***
- 2. promote the outcome of the case through the newsletter and the website.***

**6.3 Heritage Council and Heritage Office Budget Report**

Consideration of this report was deferred until the June Heritage Council meeting.

**6.4 2001 Census Time Capsule Project**

Members considered a report which advised that the traditional approach to managing name-identified census data has been changed to allow for the conservation of such data for future research purposes. Previously name-identified census data has traditionally been destroyed once statistical information from each census form has been extracted

It was noted that the 2001 census will provide for respondents to explicitly consent to their name-identified data being retained and that it will be held by the National Archives of Australia, and not released for research purposes for 99 years. Where such consent is not given the data will be destroyed.

Members were advised that the support of prominent research, historical, genealogical and heritage bodies will encourage respondents to provide their explicit consent to participate in the

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'census time capsule project' and the report recommended that this move should be supported by the Heritage Council.

***Resolved:***

***that the Heritage Council:***

- 1. supports the retention of name-identified census data for future research purposes;***
- 2. notes that respondents to the 2001 census will be asked to provide their explicit consent for the retention of their name-identified census data; and***
- 3. encourages members of the Council to favourably publicise this change in census data-gathering processes.***

### **6.5 Education Materials – Summary Report of Sample Teacher Implementation**

Members received a report of school implementation and activities arising from the K- 6 Education Curriculum Materials and the Board of Studies Web site.

It was noted that the achievements included the development of skills, values and attitudes: mapping, knowledge and understanding of heritage processes and appreciation for the 'layers' of heritage. It was also noted that it encourages local study, familiarity with databases and has excellent content for exploring Aboriginal perspectives. Some issues raised included some technical problems and teacher unfamiliarity with technology. Access and use issues were also addressed.

Members also noted a report on the Teaching Heritage Web Site which advised that it is the only professional development resource supporting new HSIE 7-10 curriculum. Comments received noted that it contains excellent material for schools to teach the mandatory site study with 1000 different people viewing the site each month and that the most popular area is the gallery of photographs of heritage buildings, followed by the timelines and the views on heritage. Issues included the need for links to SHI and Tourism NSW and the need for ongoing maintenance and upgrade, both of these dependent on funding or sponsorship

In general it was noted that the resources 'work' because they are well articulated with curriculum, they are timed well with new HSIE curriculum and are explicit teaching models with professional development.

***Resolved:***

***that the Heritage Council note the report and congratulate the HO staff involved.***

Members received a report on recently completed projects under the NSW Heritage incentives Program.
